Lions Clubs International introduced the global diabetes awareness initiative in 2016, asking clubs worldwide to take on the growing epidemic. One club in Iowa has embraced the global challenge with gusto.

At just under two years since chartering, the Solon Centennial Lions Club has come up with two unique ideas to help educate the community about diabetes. Firstly, the club purchased books about diabetes for the children's section of the town's public library.

"We had not realized there were no significant books (about diabetes) in our library for kids," said Lion Marti Hendricks, secretary of the club. She went on to explain that the library ordered the books and the club paid for them. In all, it came to a little over \$100 for the books.

The Solon Centennial club didn't stop at buying diabetes books, however. They also planned a Strides Halloween Bicycle Parade with a costume parade, bicycle decorating and obstacle course, scavenger hunt trail walk with information about diabetes hidden throughout and an inflatable obstacle course to help the kids be active. Riders of all ages were encouraged to dress in costume and decorate their bicycles to participate in the fun. The club even set up a bicycle decorating booth so participants could decorate on site.

They had prizes donated by local businesses for best costume, completing the scavenger hunt and obstacle courses.



The New Voices Initiative Expands

Lions around the world were introduced to the "New Voices Initiative" by last year's International President Gudrun Yngvadottir. As the association's first woman international president, she created the new program to promote more women members and encourage more women to be Lion leaders. Listening to the success stories of women who are passionate about Lionism would motivate other women to join our organization.

The 2019-2020 "New Voices Initiative" reflects International President Dr. Choi's theme, promoting gender parity and diversity. The program features a diverse group of Lions with the purpose of telling their success stories to interest and increase the number of women, young adults and minority members.

District Governors are asked to nominate four New Voices candidates in their districts, one in each of the following categories: service, membership, leadership, and marketing. New Voices nominees should be Lions or Leos, young or old, new or experienced, male or female, creative, innovative, and passionate about being a Lion. The nominees should be Lions whose voices have not been heard before, and they will be prepared to tell their stories.

Lions learn from each other by sharing ideas. New voices will bring new ideas! The New Voices nominees have been successful with membership growth, service projects, marketing skills and leadership skills. Sharing their success stories hopefully will motivate prospective members, as well as inspire current Lion members.

Lions Clubs International is continuing to highlight two existing programs to encourage more women to become Lions. These programs are the Women's Workshop and Women's Symposium. I recently attended the District 9MC Women's Symposium, "Celebrating Our P.R.I.D.E. (People-Responsibility-Inspiration-Development-Excellence)." The morning was planned for women by women, and attendees enjoyed sharing ideas and feelings with each other on each of the topics. District 9NC is planning a Women's Workshop to

explore attracting women to Lionism and devise strategies to increase the number of women members as well as the number of women in leadership roles.

I encourage the other districts to plan a Women's Workshop and/or host a Women's Symposium. Grants are available to help fund these events. I have resources, including the Planning Guides for workshops and symposiums and will have them available at each district convention. The Planning Guides also have information about applying for the grants.

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Mid-Winter Conference Revamped

Sign Up Now for a New Learning Experience for ALL Iowa Lions

Lions of Iowa have spoken and the MD9 State Planning Committee has listened by revamping the Iowa Lions Mid-Winter Conference by shortening the length of the conference and moving it to a venue that will keep the costs down enough that ALL Lions in Iowa should be able to attend.

"It's taken a lot of work on behalf of the committee," said State Planning Committee Chair Mendy McAdams. "We want to make it more fun and more affordable for every Lion."

The event will include learning seminars for new Lions as well as those wanting to go into leadership roles. There are meetings on Friday for the Council of Governors and the Iowa Lions Foundation trustees, but all of the rest of the activities are scheduled for Saturday only, with morning and afternoon snacks and lunch provided for a low registration fee. Awards will be presented at lunch only, and the committee has done away with the Saturday evening banquet so every Lion should be able to make it back home by evening.

Mid-Winter will take place this year at Marshalltown Community College. Lions who need to stay overnight can book one of the local hotels, and the Best Western Regency hotel has offered a special Lions rate of \$75 plus taxes for Lions who wish to stay overnight. There are also other hotels nearby.

Mid-Winter registration this year is only \$25 per person for Lions and \$10 per person for Leos. Those who wish to receive a leadership training certification with pin can also do so for an additional \$10.

This year, guests may also attend the luncheon only for just \$10. This helps those who want to be present for their friends and loved ones to receive awards.

"We've also developed different tracks of interest for the seminars," said Lion Mendy, who explained that there will be a a New Lions track with seminars on Lions Structure, Lions History and Lions Service. There is a Leadership track with seminars on "My Club, My Way," "No Mundane Meetings" and "Where's My Crown? What's Your Leadership Style?" Finally, there will be some seminars of general interest.

Registration deadline is Dec. 20. Find the registration

form on Page 23. Many clubs have voted to pay the registration fee for a number of their members who want to attend. Would your club consider doing the same to make your Lions more knowledgeable about our great association?

There will also be limited ad space in a more streamlined program for this event. See ad information on Page 22 of this issue. It's the perfect way to congratulate a Lion or publicize a fundraiser.

Schools Work Closely Together

Iowa School for the Deaf and Iowa Educational Services for the Blind and Visually Impaired (IESBVI - You may know them as Iowa Braille and Sight Saving School) are working together more closely than ever.

We share a superintendent, business office, IT, human resources, transportation and administration services. Although IESBVI no longer has students on its campus in Vinton, Iowa, it has reopened an important transition program for its students who could benefit from help with getting a job or going to college. These students have fulfilled their high school graduation requirements. The program, called Post-senior Learning for Ultimate Success (4PLUS), is located on the ISD campus. This program for blind or visually-impaired students is relatively new.

Iowa School for the Deaf has had its own 4PLUS program on the campus for more than 15 years. The two programs share transportation, a student lounge and boarding quarters (separated for boys

and for girls). They participate together in many service activities and attend job fairs and field trips together. The programs have separate teachers for the blind and for the deaf; and also have their own work experience coordinators.

4PLUS is a free program. Students who are deaf and hard of hearing needn't have attended ISD previously to benefit from this programming. Five years out of 4PLUS, we are seeing the ISD students maintaining employment at a rate that is higher than the national average among employed deaf adults.

Iowa School for the Deaf appreciates the support of Lions. Lions can especially help by letting local school administrators and families who may have students who are hard of hearing or deaf know about ISD. It is completely free to attend and has many advantages, such as direct communication with everyone. The teachers are specialized teachers of the deaf, as well. Many school districts and families do not know it is an option. Each school and family needs to talk about it and decide if it is right for them.


Come visit Iowa School for the Deaf and Iowa Educational Services for the Bind and Visually Impaired 4PLUS program!



As we start this holiday season, I would like to encourage all clubs to reach out to your community and ask what they need. Do not assume you know. Once you find what your community needs, look for ways to bring it to them. You might need to partner with other Lions Clubs or service clubs in your community. When I visit clubs, I often hear them talk about projects they would like to do but feel they are too small of a club to do it. If there is a need in your community, then find a way to get others to help. Many members in our communities want to help but do not know how.

As we move into the winter months, it is a great time for your club to start planning a Strides Walk for the spring of 2020. Look for ways to increase your community's members getting out and being active. As part of the Strides Walk, work in some education on diabetes awareness.

Each year it costs about \$16,000 to put on the camp. During the week at camp, the youth are kept very busy learning about Iowa and getting to know each other. This year, we had 22 youth from other counties participate and five Iowa youth as hosts.

One of the biggest concerns each year is finding host families. Each year, we have between 18 and 24 youth from other countries participate. They arrive about July 1 and spend about two weeks with the host families. They spend the third week at our youth camp, then they spend one more week with their host families. Many of the host families talk about how surprised they are that they get so attached to the youth in this short amount of time. Several past host families have mentioned that they keep in contact for years with the different youth they hosted.

We have started getting requests for youth to attend our July 2020 camp. If you are interested in hosting a youth this year, please let your district Youth Exchange chairperson know so they can get your name to MD9 Youth Exchange President PDG Sheri Holiday.

To help support the camp this year, \$16,000 is needed from districts, clubs and individuals. That is about \$2,300 per district. If your club gave last year, please consider giving again this year. If your club has not given, please consider donating \$100.

Here is a list of some of the activities the youth did last year:

Monday – tie-dyed a camp shirt, ziplined, low rope obstacle course, boating, swimming, and line dancing.

Tuesday – bowling, Sky Zone, shopping at the mall

Wednesday – tour the Capital and visit Adventureland

Thursday – Visit Iowa State University, swimming, ride the Story City Carousel

Friday – visit a Madison County Museum, attend the Madison County Fair, visited a buffalo farm and put on a talent show.

The Iowa Lions Youth Exchange is also looking for Iowa youth that would like to visit other countries. If you have a youth that is interested in attending a camp in another country, let your district Youth Exchange chairperson know so they can notify PDG Sheri.

This is a series about recruiting members with emphasis on visibility in your community. It is so important to make sure you are getting information out in your community about what Lions do. We have so much to write about Lions and their programs. Let us look at why this can change how you are able to bring in new members.

What do we have to share with our community? Let's talk about our answer to Helen Keller of being the "Knights for the Blind." An article centered around our growth and action with Leader Dogs for the Blind may be a topic not realized by your community. The difference we make in the life of a recipient of a Leader Dog is unbelievable. Dawn Rudolph, who is a recipient of Leader Dog Lady, has taken her into a new life and shared her story at our convention on Oct. 25 and 26. Leader Dog Lady was named the National Hero Guide Dog for 2019. It is amazing the change Lady made in Dawn's life. Let me know as district governor if you would like to receive her story to run in the local paper.

Next in this is the creation of KidSight and growth of this program by Lions across Iowa. Remember, it only happened because of a \$100,000 grant from LCIF, which is a good reason for individuals to personally give back, Lion or not, as we have helped 30,000 plus students in 9SW since the program started in 2000. This program continues to be one of the main activities by many clubs, including our newest club, the Waukee Lions Club.

Waukee Lions will be celebrating their charter night on Nov. 8 from 6-10 p.m. at the Country Lane Lodge in Adel. The costs is \$30 per person. Send registration checks to:

With about 1,000 children a year to screen, you can see why this club is looking for a camera to serve the community of preschool and kindergarten kids. It is another story to use to sell Lions to your community.

"Your Club, Your Way" gives your club unique stories on what you are accomplishing in your

community. It can be a scholarship program for seniors, giving hearing aids through the Iowa Lions Hearing Aid Bank, glasses for students in your local schools, sponsoring a child to Camp Hertko Hollow and working to improve the environment in your community. These projects need to be placed into the different forms of media to show citizens that "you serve to meet the needs of others." The more you let citizens know about Lions, the better success you will have getting new members.

There can be so much to tell but don't forget to explain that it costs as little as a cup of coffee each week to be a member of the largest service organization in the world. These few dollars from each of its 1.45 million members allows us to do all of this for individuals and communities. Lions Club International does not tell Lions what to do or who to help. That is up to each club and their members. That freedom allows clubs to be uniquely different in how they do their meetings, how they conduct their business and how they lead in their communities. This is the freedom that many clubs enjoy and carry out each year in their club.

Why not put your club on Facebook or other social media and get articles in the local paper and on radio stations? Why not advertise your club as a way to give back and pay it forward? Social media is free and yet can reach thousands of people. Put your story out there and see if in a year that you will harvest the seeds that were planted in your community. Make the stories eye catching with pictures of Lions at work in their service projects.

A shining example of media making a difference is a club in 9SW, a club that took their membership from about mid 20's to close to 60 members in a community

of 700 through visibility and asking everyone and finding many. Doubling your membership in 5 years forces your club to add more activities to accomplish the work needed to keep the club growing. Now this club is looking at a portable ice skating rink for the winter in a local park. To get members, the club is looking at young couples with kids to help build it, maintain it and literally become their unique project. More later on whether this venture is a success for this club as it tests new approaches to find members.

Growth is great. Having and establishing a Leo club is another venture that gives your community a big awareness of what Lions with a Leo club can do. Yes, 9SW is proud of the three clubs now with Leos and looks forward to convincing and helping other clubs to establish more Leo clubs. I'll touch more on Leo clubs in a future article, as well as specialty clubs and branch clubs. That will be in my second phase to help growth in 9SW. We hope to grow new clubs like Waukee. It is time to replace the loss of clubs with a gain of clubs.

Presently 9SW has its unique story about disaster relief on our west border. We have been given \$20,500 of LCIF grant money and another nearly \$20,000 in donations from individuals and clubs in Multple District 9. Presently we have filled the wish lists in Missouri Valley and in Fremont Mills schools. Hamburg, Sidney and Glenwood schools are finishing their wish lists, which not only includes school supplies but a second pair of tennis shoes for PE class, gloves and hats for students.

I'd like to give a shout out to two 9SW super heroes, GST chairs Michelle Sparks and Verneta Andersen, for organizing these projects for 9SW.

By the time you read this, our new club consultant from Lions Clubs International, Pablo Romano from New York, will have been here. He came the week of Oct. 28 to work with us on the new Latino Club in Denison. He also conducted a webinar on new club development for us prior to coming. Things have been moving rapidly and we have depended much on the great work of our PR chair, PDG Stefan Sandberg, to keep the district informed. If you haven't gotten any news on our results so far, I hope to have some to share with you soon.

I am also continuing to work on the new Campus Lions Club at Western Iowa Tech Community College in Sioux City. Some of the college administration was planning to pay a visit to the Leo Club at Exira-Elk Horn-Kimballton High School in 9SW in early October to get some ideas on how they might proceed, since it is a similar age group.

In the meantime, I have something else to share. At a recent church meeting, I was among those who viewed a video by Dr. Lovett Weems from the Lewis Center for Church Leadership. Dr. Weems stressed how important it is for a church to be connected well to its community in order to serve it effectively. He also noted that the longer a church has been around, the more likely it is to be disconnected from its community.

A new church tends to be more connected because it needs to reach people to establish itself. As the church becomes more established, it tends to move in the direction of taking care of the needs of its members, unless it makes intentional efforts to stay connected to the community. He indicated this is a natural cycle, and it happens not only with churches, but with other organizations as well.

I have seen the same thing happen with Lions Clubs. Most of our clubs in Iowa are long established. Many of our clubs have been doing the same projects for years, but communities and the people in them do change. This means that community needs also change and it means that some of the projects we do may be more for our membership than for anyone else. Remember that service is supposed to be what we do for others, not for ourselves.

Is your Lions Club connected well to your community? If not, you might want to do a Community Needs Assessment. You can find the materials for doing one on the LCI website. A Lions Club that is well connected to its community and serving the needs thereof will have no trouble finding projects. It is also likely to have more success in bringing in members in the community who want to be part of meeting those needs.

We do a lot of good as Lions, but we can always do better.

Cow Pasture Golf Raises Funds for Scholarships

Lots of Lions clubs hold golf tournaments to raise funds, but one club in Iowa has adapted their scholarship fundraiser to add a bit of fun to their golf outing.

The Bondurant Lions Club recently held its 21st annual Cow Pasture Golf Tournament, raising approximately \$9,000 for scholarships.

Originally founded by Lions Ted Griffieon, Jim Gocke and Dick Moore, the tournament is held on an actual cow pasture, mowed appropriately for greens and has eight-inch holes instead of the smaller ones.

It used to be a normal golf tournament, but the Lions figured out the golf courses were making most of the money. A Lion suggested they use his cow pasture and a fun new way of raising funds was started.

There are also some fun variances to holes. This year, hole No. 1 had a gravity box sitting at the bottom

and the golfers were supposed to put the ball in a wagon. Another hole was a right-left hole.

"If you are right-handed, you have to use a left-handed club," said Club President Jeff Obrecht.

This year they introduced a sling shot hole. "We bought a water balloon sling shot and made it a team effort," Obrecht said. "Two team members hold the ends while the golfer pulls the sling shot at the tee."

Registration started at noon. Shotgun start for Best Ball tournament began at 1 o'clock. The \$50 registration fee gets the golfers their golf, a cart, five door prize tickets and a pork loin dinner afterwards. Golfers were allowed to bring their own cart, which could be a John Deere Gator or other vehicle, if they wanted. Then their entry fees were only \$30.

This is the club's big fundraiser to pay for their college scholarships. "Last year we gave \$6,000 to seniors graduating from Bondurant. This year, it looks like we'll be able to give nine scholarships," Obrecht said.
