

Area Lions Clubs Partner for Diabetes Prevention

Receive \$52,000 Grant to Benefit Local Communities

The Lions Clubs in Grinnell, Kellogg, Montezuma and Victor recently received a Lions Club International Foundation Diabetes Grant and will partner with UnityPoint Health – Grinnell Regional Medical Center (GRMC), Grinnell Mutual Reinsurance, Manatt's, Inc. and the Mayflower to offer a diabetes prevention program to the surrounding communities. The grant is the first Lions Clubs International Foundation Diabetes Grant in Iowa.

During the two-year grant period, local Lions Clubs will assist with the screenings held in the communities of Grinnell, Montezuma, Kellogg and Victor. The grant will fund screening as well as follow-up care for those identified as prediabetic or diabetic. The project is designed to increase awareness of prediabetes by identifying higher risk individuals, increasing the availability of, and enrollment in, a diabetes prevention program, and developing a referral process to a comprehensive follow-up care program for those identified as prediabetic or diabetic.

"I am excited to partner together with GRMC, the local Lions Clubs and various community businesses to improve the well-being of our community," says Dave Stoakes, Grinnell Lions Club member and GRMC Board

Chair-Elect. "I am really proud of how our community can come together to make amazing things happen. It is truly an honor to receive the only grant in Iowa and we cannot wait to assist our community in being the best that they can be."

According to the Diabetes Statistics Report 2014, diabetes is the fastest growing chronic condition in the United States. It is projected that by 2020, 15 percent of adults will have diabetes and by 2050, one in three adults will have diabetes. There are many risk factors associated with diabetes and having one or more risk factors increases the likelihood of developing diabetes. Common risk factors include: obesity, physical

inactivity, poor diet, older age, family history and ethnicity.

Any community member can attend a screening at any location. The screening starts with completing an American Diabetes Association (ADA) risk assessment; a simple form with various prediabetes risk questions. Individuals who are identified by the assessment as atrisk for prediabetes or Type 2 diabetes will complete a consent form to have their blood drawn to measure A1C levels – at no cost. Individuals will also need to have their height and weight measured to determine body mass index (BMI), as a BMI greater than or equal to 25 is necessary for enrollment into the program.

Heather Coffman, Ph.D., is the corporate wellness coordinator at GRMC and will lead the prediabetes prevention project as the program director. She will facilitate the project providing education and risk assessments and will ultimately serve as the lifestyle coach.

Coffman said, "This grant is such an amazing opportunity for our communities. According to a 2016-2017 report from the Centers for Disease Control, 35 percent of the residents in the state of Iowa are prediabetic. This grant will give our community members an opportunity to learn more about their well-being and learn skills to better their health for years to

come."

Individuals identified as prediabetic/diabetic will be contacted by Coffman to review their results. Those identified as diabetic will be referred to their family physician and those identified as prediabetic will be referred to the Lifestyle Change Program. Individuals enrolled in the Lifestyle Change Program will then have the comprehensive blood panel completed – at no cost. The comprehensive blood panel will include total cholesterol and high-density lipoproteins (HDL).

The Lifestyle Change Program is a yearlong course that highlights various topics which include: setting goals, physical activity recommendations, stress management, positive self-talk and information on proper nutrition from a registered dietician. The program meets weekly the first four months and changes to bi-weekly, then monthly as the year progresses. This program is a great opportunity for community members to learn new skills and have the ability to test them in their real-life environment.

Grant funding for the project is \$52,000 with LCIF providing \$39,000 and area Lions Clubs and project partners raising \$13,000.

News from the 2019 Fall International Board Meeting

The 2019 fall International Board meeting was held in Jackson Hole, Wyoming, where the entire board joined the executive officers in unanimous support of PID Fabricio Oliveira from Brazil for 3rd vice president in the election at 2020 Singapore International Convention.

Lions Quest will expand in the next five years to touch five million youth annually. Currently, Quest touches 500-750,000 lives each year.

The Global Action Team is continuing to work on service reporting (it IS higher than last year thus far).

The Convention Committee is working on a more efficient way of dispersing the presidential pins at international convention.

One additional night was approved for the DGEs so

that they can stay for the final plenary session.

No longer will multiple districts be allowed to "tape off" sections for seating at the plenary sessions.

The Leadership Committee's goal is to have 500,000 people participate in training events annually.

The Marketing Committee is asking all club secretaries to please proofread every member's address monthly, since only 45% of our members have "good" emails, thus they are not receiving their international LION magazine.

"Strides" has a new logo and is being rebranded.

We have a 41% increase in potential members from our websites!

The Service Committee is encouraging every multiple district to work on advocacy with their state legislators.

The Membership Committee created a new "Young Adult Team" from young Lions across North America for the North American Membership Initiative. New members under age 40 are up more than 25% from last year.

We're encouraged to work hard on new "specialty" clubs.

The District/Club Committee is looking at not allowing PDGs to be zone chairs, then address the repeat of DGs after that rule is in place. MD9, it's time for us to find new leaders in each of our districts! I believe this new rule will take effect on July 1, 2020.

home because the ramp gives them easy access. The child that can now see the chalk board in school. The child that gets to attend a diabetic or low-vision camp and experience what other kids do at summer camp.

The ripples are everyone else affected. The child that gets to play at a park built 30 years ago by Lions. The son or daughter that does not need to worry about their parents because they have a ramp to allow them to safely go in and out of the house. The grandchild that gets to have their grandparent attend and see their sporting event because a Lions Club helped that grandparent get a new pair of glasses. The child who knows their parents can listen to their choir concert thanks to a pair of hearing aids received by the Iowa Lions Hearing Aid Bank or a cochlear implant from the University of Iowa Cochlear Implant Center, which are both supported by the Iowa Lions Foundation.

When your club does KidSight screenings, keep in mind you might identify a child that has eye issues that may have gone blind if not caught when they were 3 years old. That child might go on to discover a cure for cancer or diabetes.

Stop and think about how many ripples your club has caused by doing service in your community and the number of lives you have changed for the positive.



Celebrating the Holidays in a Diabetes-Friendly Way

New Years Day, plus or minus two months, is the period in which we celebrate the holidays and numerous bowl games. If you are the host or hostess of a party observing these annual events, navigating a diabetes-friendly menu can be a potential challenge.

First of all, if you are the recipient of the one fruitcake that is circulating in the country, do not serve it. Fruitcakes are high in fat and carbs. Some backpackers carry a fruitcake, so if they run out of food, the fruitcake will provide them nutrition for a week. Seriously, most entrées such as turkey or chicken, or roasts, steaks or chops of beef or pork are low carb as long as they are not breaded or immersed in gravy.

Vegetables, with the exception of a few starchy items like corn or peas, or several helpings of white potatoes, should be on every diabetic's menu.

For dessert, fresh fruit, while containing fructose, also has plenty of fiber to help slow the absorption of glucose. There are many sugar-free desserts that will address the needs of one's sweet tooth, but remember, portion control is still key. Consider sugar-free pumpkin mousse or sugar-free jello or pudding with sugar-free whipped topping. There are many sugar-free dessert recipes available on the internet, including cheesecake, angel food cake and pumpkin pie.

The challenge comes before the "big game." With a little planning, you can have most of the ingredients in your kitchen to provide healthy game day snacks. Good diabetic snacks are high in fiber, have a good mix of protein and healthy carbs, contain some healthy fats and are nutrient dense. They are limited in simple carbs, low in added sugar and sodium. Just as important is portion control. The overall goal is to keep blood glucose stable. Fiber and protein and a small amount of healthy fats slow digestion and keep blood glucose from rising and falling too quickly.

Water, with or without lemon, is a choice for many diabetics. Diabetics often avoid most soft drinks unless they have a Zero in their name or highly-sugared drinks. Alcohol has a tendency to spike the blood glucose, so many drink with moderation.

We wish you a happy holiday season. Celebrate and

support your team in a low carb fashion.

We have completed two district-wide service projects already this year. At the 9SW District

Convention in Winterset, we completed over 300 blessing bags with many donated items which will be distributed at homeless shelters. Then we were off to 9EC Fall Rally at Camp Courageous in Monticello to make milkweed seed balls, which help our bee and butterfly population. They will be tossed into roadside ditches around our state.

What is your club's favorite service project? Do you have a favorite one or one that is unique to your community? Sharing those projects gives others new or better ideas. Maybe what you do for your community is that ah ha moment for someone else's community.

Service projects are the best recruiting tool you have available to you. As I write this, we have made good progress towards starting the new Hispanic Lions Club in Denison, with the working name, not yet finalized, of Denison Hispanic American Lions Club (Club de Leones Hispano Americano de Denison in Spanish).

We have just over half of the 20 members required for chartering signed up. We have several other people who are interested and the leaders already emerging among those who have signed up are actively working on recruiting the additional members we need. They have already begun discussing possible service projects and have set their next meeting for Dec. 7. I am hopeful they will be able to sign up enough additional members to have their organizational meeting. If that happens, they may have their charter approved by the end of December. Guiding Lion Sondra Rierson from the Carroll Lions Club is already working with them to help them get there and doing a great job. Thank you, Lion Sondra!

We also have gotten great help in this effort from our New Club Consultant Pablo Romano of New York, whose fluency in the Spanish language and Hispanic culture and ability to connect with people has been instrumental in helping us get things off the ground. We also had great support from LaTanya Gatewood from the New Clubs Department at LCI Headquarters in Oak Brook, Illinois, who was there primarily to observe Pablo in action but also was a valuable resource in her own right. State Administrator Tim Wilson also has been a great help in sharing his knowledge and experience. I am grateful for all of them.

This was an especially gratifying experience for me. As our team began connecting with people in the Hispanic community in Denison and telling them what Lions is and what a Lions Club can do for their community, we heard over and over "We need this! This will be good for us! It will help unify our community." We also received a great deal of encouragement from the Anglo community.

This will be the first Hispanic Lions Club in Iowa. I am told we are being watched with interest by Lion leaders all over the state who see communities in their

areas that could benefit from a Hispanic Lions Club. We can be proud that District 9NW is being a pacesetter in this effort.

It is hard to believe I am nearly halfway through my year as district governor. The time is flying by rapidly. As I say this, I am concerned about what happens after June 30, 2020, when my term expires. Lions district governors only serve one year and are not allowed to succeed themselves. At this point, we do not know who your district governor will be next year, or the year after that. With District Governor-Elect Training happening outside of Chicago in February, it would be good to have the next district governor attend that training so they will be better prepared for the job at hand.

Being district governor is a rewarding experience. I enjoy visiting clubs and learning about how they serve their communities. I appreciate the friendships I have made by serving in this way. The experience of starting a new club, of watching new people get excited about being a Lion, is truly a blessing. If you are worried about cost, many of your expenses as district governor, and even as vice district governor, are reimbursed by Lions Clubs International, our multiple district, or your district.

Please consider stepping up. One usually has to be a zone chair to become 2nd vice district governor, but the two positions can be done simultaneously, if necessary. Our district has numerous zone chair positions open. The zone chair typically has oversight of five to eight clubs and is expected to visit the clubs and to hold three meetings a year for those clubs to come together to learn from one another and share ideas. Zone chairs are also members of the district cabinet, but we are now doing most cabinet meetings by conference call, eliminating the drive to attend a two-hour meeting. The job is not hard and there is plenty of training, resources and support available for those who choose to serve in this way.

There are many great leaders in our clubs. Please step up and help lead our district and please encourage other leaders in your club to step up.

The thought process is if you or your club has a culture of growing in service activities, growing fundraisers, growing in leadership and growing membership, then you have a culture of GREEN & GROWING. To become green and growing just doesn't happen without some planning and goal setting. If you and/or your club is setting goals, your club will most likely be green & growing.

Staying the same or staying static is non-existent, it is not possible. If your club is declining in membership, having a hard time getting other members to step into an officer role (leadership), losing service activities and fundraisers, chances are your club is brown and dying. It isn't all doom and gloom. In order to move your club from brown and dying to green and growing, set up a meeting with your members and have a brainstorming session on how to improve your club. Can you add a service activity or a fundraiser? If so, what can it be? Can anyone else step up into an officer position? Can you add some new members? If so, come up with a plan on how to get them.

LCIF Funds Come Back to Iowa

Coordinator Offers to Match New Giving to Campaign 100

LCIF grant funding is coming back to Iowa. I would like to congratulate the following clubs: Grinnell, Kellogg, Montezuma and Victor who banded together in the cause of Diabetes Awareness in their communities. Lions Clubs International Foundation's Board of Trustees approved the LCIF Diabetes Grant application DIA17072/9MC in the amount of \$39,000 over a two-year project period. In addition to this, District 9MC is required to raise \$13,000 in the form of cash donations for this project. This amount is a combined collection of \$6,500 from Lions and \$6,500 from partners.

The grant total funding is \$52,000 which has a local buy-in of \$13,000. LCIF is a jump starter of

projects. These good works can have lasting results. One in particular is Iowa KidSight, which continues through our local support.

So as Lions, we at LCIF are asking for your support in Campaign 100. Support has not been asked like this since Campaign Sight First II. We are asking for your PERSONAL support as a Lion. We Lions are many in number (1.44 million). If we all make a contribution, the Campaign 100 goal will be reached and more projects serving our communities will be made possible.

To jump start personal giving in the period January 2020 through April 2020, I personally challenge each district to increase new personal giving to LCIF. I will match up to \$1,000 in total per district giving for new personal contributions to LCIF. So at the end of April 2020, MD9's collective \$7,000 in new personal giving will turn into a total of \$14,000 for LCIF. So how about it?




