News from 2020 Virtual June International Board Meeting

To support the incredible Lions around the globe, the international board passed these resolutions to help clubs: All entrance fees are waived from July 1 through December 31, 2020: no charter entrance fees, no fee to join an existing club, no fee to transfer clubs. Flexible payments: no clubs will be suspended or cancelled through December 31, 2020 for late payment of dues.

Due to the cancellation of the 103rd Lions Clubs International Convention in Singapore, there was no election held, so all executive officers and international directors will continue to serve through June 29, 2021. The only change on the 2020-2021 international board is two new Leo-Lion liaisons: Aayush Bagla from India and Juan Manuel Caceres from Uraguay. The board voted to award Singapore as the site for the 2028 LCI convention.

My New Lions Clubs International Assignments for 2020-21

I was elected to the Lions Clubs International Foundation Board of Trustees, representing Constitutional Area 1 (USA) for a one year term. The LCIF board consists of five executive officers, 15 trustees representing each of the constitutional areas and two board appointees. I'll be serving on the LCIF Development Committee.

Our LCIF trustee meetings are held three times a year, usually at international headquarters. This year due to COVID-19, they will probably be virtual, just like the international board meetings. The new trustee training

will be virtual as well.

In addition, First International Vice President Douglas Alexander has asked me to be one of his District Governor-Elect Group Leaders.

International Guest Speakers for 2020-21 MD9 Events

International speakers are lined up for all 2020-21 MD9 events, including the state convention and the seven district conventions. A current international director will speak at each convention except for two, which are scheduled during an international board meeting. They will have a past international director.

Celebrate the Strength of Your Club with an International Award

The Club Excellence Award is presented to any Lions club who has exhibited strength from July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020 in four categories:

- 1. **Membership:** achieve a NET growth OR sponsored a new Lions or Leo club or club branch;
- 2. **Service:** started a new service project AND made a contribution to LCIF (club and/or personal donation); Service activities MUST have been reported on MyLion during the Lion year.
- 3. **Organizational Excellence:** club is in good standing (no unpaid balance to LCI) AND officers participated in some type of training (in person or virtual) AND improved club operations;
- 4. **Marketing and Communication:** the club has publicized service activities through local and social media.

The 2019-2020 Club Excellence Award Application deadline is Aug. 31, 2020. The 2019-2020 district governor's signature is required on the application form. Fax the completed form to 630-468-6828 or email it to clubexcellenceaward@lionsclubs.org. Find the application form at the LCI website by typing "Club Excellence Award Application" in the search box. I want to start out by congratulating our new district governors on their elections. I am excited to see all the success you have in this coming Lions year. You all have talented people on your teams.

It is the beginning of our 2020-2021 Lions year and we have some really cool things coming up for you. But first, let us address our recent past and current situations. We are still living with COVID-19. Many have not held a club meeting in some time, some have met online and then some have been reaching out to club members with phone calls. If any of you have questions about how to meet online, reach out to your district governors. They can provide you with the means to get this done or put you in touch with someone in your district that can help. Please continue to make every effort to reach out to each other and meet those needs that you can.

Now on to a tough topic. Many clubs have lost their major fundraisers due to cancellations. How do we make up for those lost dollars? Here are a few suggestions I have run across that have worked for other Lions clubs in other multiple districts.

Corporate sponsorships: Think of those businesses that have helped you out in the past or that you have done business with. Put together a sponsorship letter describing what your club does in your community and that due to the current cancellations for fundraisers, you are trying something new. Ask them to buy into what and how you support your community.

You can let businesses define how much or you can set levels of support. For example, a bronze sponsorship is \$100 and below, silver sponsorship is \$101 to \$500 and a gold sponsorship is \$501

and up. Then create a poster with all your sponsors names on it that can be displayed at your events letting the community know what businesses supported you. Make a point of asking your members to frequent those businesses.

Keep Lions Clubs visible by continuing to serve your community through projects that do not cost the club money. Look for opportunities like Meals on Wheels deliveries, volunteering at food pantries, running errands for those who cannot come out right now, cleaning up roadsides or parks. It lets your community know that you are still serving.

You might have to resort to the good old-fashioned car wash where patrons stay in their cars. Consider a roadside collection day handing out Lions Mints for donations like the veterans do with poppies or firemen do with the boots. Be sure to get community leaders approval for this one.

Remember, where there is a will, there is a way. At 103 years old, our organization has survived many life altering moments. We will survive this too. We just need to get creative!

Now, the plan for this year. Let us talk about NAMI, or North America Membership Initiative. Did you know that for the last 40 years Constitutional Area 1 (United States and affiliates, Bermuda and Bahamas) and CA2 (Canada) have ended every year with a minus in membership? At one time, there were 18,000 Lions in Iowa. Today we have approximately 7,800 Lions.

NAMI covers three areas of focus: new members in existing clubs, retention of current members and adding new clubs in all districts. Each district has named a NAMI champion who will lead the charge in accomplishing these three goals. If you have questions or see yourself helping in this membership effort, please contact your district governor.

In closing, I wish all of you a great Lions year. If I can be of any help or answer questions, just reach out. Remember, WE SERVE in Kindness and Diversity.

CDC (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention)

Know these guidelines, follow these guidelines.

Wear a mask. Social distance. Wash your hands often. Don't touch your face.

Screening Sites

The rules at our screening sites apply to us too.

Screening activities going forward will greatly be determined by the rules at the sites where we extend screenings.

Sites where we typically screen, e.g., daycares, preschools, elementary schools, may or may not be allowing visitors.* Circumstances may vary from site-to-site, and from day-to-day, throughout our lowa communities.

Guidelines for childcare programs and schools can be found on the lowa Department of Public Health website: https://idph.iowa.gov/Emerging-Health-Issues/Novel-Coronavirus/Guidance.

Iowa KidSight-Specific

We must remain flexible and accept change.

Circumstances may rapidly change, right down to the minute that a screening session was scheduled to begin. Limit screening teams to no more than two people.

No stickers for the children as rewards at this time.

School personnel should escort children. No physical contact (this includes high fives/elbow bumps, etc.).

Wear a mask at all times (non-negotiable). Face shields encouraged.

Iowa KidSight Screeners

If you have *any* symptoms of being ill, reschedule screening sessions for another time. No coughs (non-negotiable). If you are not comfortable extending vision screenings, don't.

If you are in a high-risk category for COVID and typically do the vision screening on behalf of your Lions Club, ask for help at this time, either within your Lions Club, or with a new recruit, or with a neighboring Lions Club, or contact the lowa KidSight office: KidSight@uiowa.edu or 319-353-7616. Vision screenings may have to be postponed for a while longer in some circumstances.

- » Conduct an induction ceremony.
- » Ensure that new members are properly onboarded.

Lions Repair Wayside Park Shelter

The purpose was to raise and reinforce sagging corner posts of the park shelter and to repair and replace deteriorated railings. Wayside Park has been maintained by the Lions for many years, with annual financial support from the Montezuma Mothers Club.

The park is located just north of the home of Randy Simmons and his wife, Cedar. When asked if they could supply water in case it was needed for cement mixing, they jumped onboard as working volunteers.

The lumber cost about \$200. Repairs were completed in about three hours. This was due in part to the use of tractors with end-loaders to temporarily lift the corners, and other creative engineering and craftsmanship by the workers.

Out of this workshop the following goals were identified:

- Charter one new club in Anamosa
- Bring the Durant Branch club to full Lions club status
- Charter a branch club in Le Claire
- Rebuild the Maquoketa Lions Club
- Induct 120 new members into existing clubs
- Lose no more than 80 members

I know those are ambitious goals while we are still in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic. However, if we are going to accomplish growing our clubs, adding new clubs and reducing the number of members leaving our clubs, we must have measurable goals to succeed.

Some of the things we took away from the workshop. We need to improve training at the club, zone and region levels. We need to improve communication between the clubs, zones, regions and district. We need to be open to new ideas and remember that change is good. In order to encourage new members to join, we need to move forward.

In order to accomplish the goals and address needed change, the group identified things that need to be done at each level in the district:

1. District Team

- Lead by example
- Better communications, phone calls, and emails
- · Assist club leaders in direction to lead
- Visit clubs more, not just in the annual visits
- District activities that all clubs can participate in

2. Regions & Zones Chairs

- Be active in your regions/zones
- Better communications, phone calls and emails
- Let the district governor know when clubs need help
- · Call clubs monthly

3. From Our Clubs

- Be more active in community
- Communicate in person, phone calls and emails
- Think outside the box
- Think of new projects
- Grow your membership

The district team wants to work with clubs that need assistance in these areas. We need your renewed commitment to succeed.

Another area that was discussed at the workshop was our Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats (SWOT). The results of our analysis is as follows:

1. Most significant Strengths

- KidSight Screening/Vision
- · Donations we make to our community
- Community involvement
- Lions working together as a team

2. Most Significant Weaknesses

- · Recruiting new members
- Our members are aging
- Getting younger people to join
- Members are reluctant to move into leadership positions

3. Most significant Opportunities

- Starting Branch Clubs for younger members
- Publicizing what we do in our community and the world

- Technology and Social Media can improve communication
- Reward members for their accomplishments

4. Most Significant Threats

- Lack of member involvement
- Key members leaving the club
- Priorities of families have changed (youth traveling to sports, parents with more than 1 job)
- · Aging Clubs

Our members established good goals. In a future issue of The Iowa Lion, I will discuss developing an action plan to implement the goals.

Lions Club International has agreed to partner with us in adding new members to existing clubs and chartering new clubs in our district. LCI has waived the \$35 one-time entrance fee for new and charter members through Dec. 31, 2020.

We need to take advantage of this opportunity by asking new members to join our clubs. We must do what it takes to expand our service in our communities and with more Lions we can do that.

Will you help by leading your club on this journey to greater service, increasing membership, retention and enhanced leadership opportunities? We need your renewed commitment to succeed.

Some Thoughts on the COVID-19 Pandemic

How do clubs hold meetings, do fundraising activities and provide support to our communities during the

pandemic?

Holding Club Meetings. We need to get back in the swing of things. Holding meetings is a must now more than ever and there are several ways to do that. You can have a picnic in the park, meet in a pavilion, hold a Zoom meeting, or have a conference call.

Fundraising. I have seen a of couple ideas on Facebook. One example is to hold a wine tasting party over Zoom from the convenience of your home. They are told up front that this s a fundraiser for Lions and they are asked to pay \$20 to join. Each participant buys two or three different wines to taste. While on Zoom, you taste and evaluate the wine and you can also make recommendations on the food each wine would best be served with.

Community Support. One idea that can be done now is having a drive-by drop-off food drive. They advertise the locations and times when Lions will be at the drop-off sight and ask members of the community to bring non-perishable items. This provides a safe environment for community members and our Lions. We need to share ideas with other clubs so we can continue to serve our communities.

I have no doubt that you will choose the meeting type that will be a safe environment and best meet the needs of your club.

2020 has been a year to remember and one we all wish we could forget. It seems that everything has been canceled. All this is due to the COVID-19 pandemic. There! I said it, but I do not like to mention it since it brings to mind all the things we have had to cancel. In another sense, I think that giving it a name gives it some place in my life and I just want to get back to normal. So, I will just refer to it as the "pandemic" going forward since that seems vague and nonspecific.

There is an old saying that when you have lemons you should make lemonade. That is just what we need in these dog days of summer. The pandemic has brought us challenges (lemons) and



opportunities (lemonade). We have been social distancing and wearing face masks. We have missed out on seeing our loved ones in nursing homes and in the hospital. In the case of those that have passed, we are still awaiting a funeral. This is heartbreaking to say the least.

Besides the personal challenges, we have experienced serious challenges to how we plan, prepare and deliver service to our communities. It has strained our ability to meet in person. In some cases, I fear this has been a serious detriment to the survival of some Lions clubs focused more on meetings and fundraisers than service. The worst thing about the whole situation is the uncertainty. I believe we can expect significant uncertainty over the next twelve months if we try to do things like we have always done them expecting the same results.

Therein lies the opportunity. Some have said that this pandemic will have caused humanity to leap forward five years technologically in the next twelve to eighteen months.

At my place of business, we have been embracing the virtual meetings more than ever and harnessing the power of the "cloud" for virtualization of our computers, servers and telephone system. The way I see it, we need to identify that wave crashing in and determine to get our surf boards out to ride it into the safety of the shoreline.



If we do not ride the



wave, we may be stranded at sea for years to come. However, all this upheaval brings fear, uncertainty, and doubt (F.U.D.) that stresses some folks out. Thus, we must be patient to show grace as we bring them along. I do not

believe in letting F.U.D. run my life, so I always look for a way to surf to show the way for others to follow. Uncertainty comes because of change. We must embrace the change by looking outside our box and status quo.

I want to encourage all the clubs of 9SE to bring certainty to your club meetings by embracing a virtual meeting format. Use tools like Microsoft Teams (see my July newsletter), Zoom, Google Meet, FreeConferenceCall.com or whatever you like. Find a tech savvy person in your club (or a friend in the community that you could ask to be a Lion) and have them set it up.

Will you get it right the first time? No. Will there be bumps in the road? Yes. Should you give up? No. Will you get better with practice? Yes. I am not aware of what all other clubs are doing. Burlington Host normally meets at noon weekly, but we have only had a few meetings virtually. I think that will increase in the coming months. The Victor club tried Zoom. It seemed to work well enough for the first time, but they are going to try again for the next meeting. Iowa City Host is meeting as a club twice a month plus one board meeting all in Zoom, and it sounds like it is going well. I would like to hear from others about how it is going. Maybe your club meeting schedule and time needs to change to accommodate members.

Your District Governor Team and district cabinet have met once already virtually and we plan to do so again the end of July. I have participated in numerous Multiple District 9 and



Constitutional Area 1 meetings virtually. I even completed my district governor training and was sworn in by International President Dr. Jung-Yul Choi in a global virtual simulcast.

Past District Governor Debbie Doty has been conducting zone chair training virtually for the last few weeks, and we intend to conduct officer training for presidents, secretaries and treasurers virtually very soon. All of this will be posted to our District 9SE YouTube channel. We also are posting things to our 9SE Facebook page. Please subscribe to our YouTube channel and like our Facebook page. Besides the social media component, we will also send out emails as appropriate.

Please note that our District Governor Team, including 1st Vice DG Nancy Oehler Love and 2nd Vice DG Brenda Axtell will be reaching out to you very soon to schedule a club visit. We split these up on a rotation so one person is not going to everything. We always like to hear from the clubs regarding what service projects you have going on. Please reach out and invite us via email or telephone. We can conduct officer inductions, new member initiations, or simply meet and greet the club entirely virtually if your club is not meeting in person. We would be glad to assist or facilitate the virtual meetings as well.

I have some great news to report. As of July 13, we have

two new members and only one dropped member so far this year. Our district goal is to have a net increase of at least one, at least 100 total new members, no more than 100 dropped members, and at least one new club. We will be continuing with the North America Membership Initiative (NAMI), which is a strategic planning process to reverse our declining growth trend. The foundations we lay this year in training for officers, zone chairs, and Guiding Lions will support our long-term efforts to increase the number of clubs in our district.

It is my firm belief that membership comes through service when we ask friends and acquaintances to join us in a service project. They catch the spirit of service and a light comes on in them that says, "I want to be a part of that." Thus, a new Lions member is born.

We all joined Lions for different reasons. Some catch the service spirit early, but for others it takes some time. I recall

sitting at lunch with International First Vice President Douglas Alexander from New York. He recounted the time when as a Lion he took groceries for a Thanksgiving meal to the home of a needy family. He recounted how he saw the

I hope that everyone reading this article can reflect on those times in your lives. I pray if you have not yet experienced that feeling of "becoming a Lion," you will organize or volunteer in more service projects in order to catch the spirit and share it with other prospective members.

If you have caught the spirit of service as I have, I challenge you to step into leadership roles. If we honestly believe the slogan, "Where there is a need, there is a Lion," then you must understand that we need more leaders in order to increase our capacity to serve our communities.

Leadership can come in many forms, but please do not wait to be asked. One way to lead is to give back to Lions Club International Foundation. If every member would commit \$100 per year, can you imagine the level of service and assistance we could accomplish globally? Even \$25 per year (the cost of a large supreme pizza) is a step in the right direction. LCIF has given over \$4 million back around the world to help keep people safe during this pandemic.

That reminds me of some other good news. Our district received a \$10,000 grant from LCIF to provide meals to hospital, clinic and nursing home workers as they service patients in the counties worst-hit by the pandemic. Contact

Besides the behind the scenes leadership like giving, please consider stepping into a leadership role in your club as vice president or service chair. We have over forty volunteers in our district cabinet this year and that helps us get a lot of work done. We are still looking for zone chairs for Zones 6 and 7. The only requirement is that you have been a club president. We also need a diabetes chair, and we have a great opportunity in that our district convention will be in Burlington on Nov. 14, which is World Diabetes Awareness Day.

Harlan Lions Club in Action During COVID-19

The Harlan Lions Club has sponsored and held mobile pantries for about 10 years. They do the pantry four to six times per year and it has always been inside except for the very first one and the last one that the club hosted.

Harlan Lions work with the Foodbank of the Heartland on this project. They provide all the food for the Lions and the Lions usually got it at no cost to the club. If the club wants to supplement and add protein/meat or other products, they can do that, too. If the club does have to pay for items, the funds are provided by the club and other businesses, organizations, individuals and grants. At each distribution, Lions usually plan on serving about 130-150 families – that is about 500 people. They come from Shelby County and just about every contiguous county.

There are usually about 50 volunteers at each distribution and the Lions members make up 10-20 of those.

Shelby County is one of the under-served counties as far as families that need food. That is why the Lions started the project in the beginning and the need

has always been there and seems to have grown now under current conditions. The food the Lions provide goes to families of one all the way up to 10. They do not discriminate in any way and everyone that comes is eligible.

The volunteers are from all age groups and even little kids come with their parents and help. It is a great learning experience for all.

On the recent mobile pantry, they served 144 families and 109 cars went through.



Washington Lions Offer Support to Shut-Ins

Finding ways to continue service during a pandemic may be difficult, but the Washington Lions Club figured out a way to keep members serving while offering encouragement to residents in long-term care facilities.

With nursing homes and assisted living facilities limiting visitors in an effort to control COVID-19 infections, many elderly residents have been isolated. That's when club members came up with the Lions Club Outreach 2020 Campaign.

Ten club members signed up to participate in creating and writing greeting cards for residents in the retirement homes, care center and nursing homes in Washington.

"We are currently working on Phase II of this card campaign," Lion Lyle Moen explained. "In total, the club members will be delivering 326 greeting cards to the residents, including a thankyou card addressed to the staff at each facility."

Past District Governor Rachel Nicola and her husband Past International Director Dave Stoufer

developed a "written script" that Lions could use in the cards, if they didn't want to come up with their own verbiage.

"Some of our members actually made handmade cards," said Moen. "One even created special cards for July 4th using red, white, blue fabric cut into strips. So there were many different forms of cards created, which will be more meaningful for the residents in case they may share a greeting card with another resident."

"I was a paper maker and quite a card maker the 25 years I lived in Florida," said Lion Marilyn Klise, widow of Past International Director Bud Klise. "I even gave classes on making your own paper (from scratch)."

Moen explained that during the first phase of the project, Lions just addressed cards to a specific facility. During Phase II, they will address some of the greetings to specific residents whose names have been provided to the Lions by the staff. In both phases, cards will be dropped off at each facility to be distributed to residents by the staff, saving the club about \$150 in postage.
