Elijah's Story: Cochlear Implant Center Restores Relationships

The Iowa Lions Foundation, in partnership with the University of Iowa Cochlear Implant Center, helps 150 men, women and children gain the gift of hearing each year. This is one such story:

Little Elijah was a happy, seemingly healthy baby boy. His parents were stunned when he was immediately taken from his 18 month check-up to the Pediatric Intensive Care Unit. This young family wouldn't leave the hospital for 54 days.

Elijah's doctor had found a tangerine-sized tumor on the toddler's brain, which would later be diagnosed as a Medulloblastoma. This form of cancer affects 250-500 children annually, accounting for about 20% of all juvenile brain cancers (Cancer.net Editorial Staff, 2020).

For two months, Elijah endured several surgeries and his first round of chemotherapy. Finally, the young family was to return home, but would spend most of the next eight months in hospital rooms. The first three rounds of chemo took place at Blank Children's Hospital in Des Moines. Then Elijah was transferred to the University of Iowa Stead Family Children's Hospital for three rounds of bone marrow transplants.

The chemotherapy was particularly hard on his ears, rendering him completely deaf on one

side and highly impaired on the other. It was in Iowa City that the University of Iowa Cochlear Implant Center gave Elijah two implants and the ability to hear once again.

LaShelle, Elijah's mother, says, "Despite communication being extremely minimal with our son after seven brain surgeries, the excellent team at (the University

of Iowa Cochlear Implant Center) has gotten his hearing functioning fully across all sound points in both ears.

"They have been incredible to work with," she continued. "Very supportive and extremely patient with us finding out how to work with our son and

get him set up for the most success possible. We are very thankful they were willing to work with us, and to have access to this opportunity."

With Iowa Lions Foundation donations, the University of Iowa Cochlear Implant Center was able to not only restore Elijah's hearing, but also his relationship with his parents and the world around him.

<u>A HISTORY OF DIABETES – PART 4</u>

The Modernization of Insulin

In 1922, the team of Sir Fredrick Banting, Charles Best, James Collup and Richard MacLeod provided the world with insulin, the first totally effective treatment for diabetes mellitus.

Eli Lilly Pharmaceutical Company collaborated with Banting and Best in 1923 and introduced Iletin. Iletin was the first commercially-produced insulin product. It was produced from the pancreases of hogs and cattle. It fell short of demand and the potency varied up to 25% per lot. The development of isoelectric precipitation led to a purer and more potent animal insulin, which had a variation of 10% between lots.

In 1923, August Krogh, a professor in the Department of Zoophysiology at the University of Copenhagen, met with Banting and MacLeod to find out more about insulin because his wife had diabetes mellitus.

Krogh had developed the Krogh Principle, which states that among the diversity of animal species there will be one ideally-suited as an experimental model for any biological problem.

He received authorization from the University of Toronto to bring insulin to Scandinavia. Nordisk Insulin Laboratory, a non-profit body, began the production of insulin.

Today Eli Lilly, Novo Nordisk and Sanofi control 99% of the insulin market with Novo Nordisk the largest producer.

In the early 1930s, Hans Christian Hagedorn of Nordisk found that adding protamine to insulin would form microscopic clumps, which would prolong its absorption into the body. This became known as Neutral Protamine Hagedorn insulin, or isophane insulin, which was an intermediate-acting insulin. It acted in 90 minutes and lasted for 24 hours.

About 1935, D.A. Scott and A.M. Fisher, of the University of Toronto, discovered that by adding zinc to protamine insulin, the action could be prolonged from 24 to 36 hours. This was called protamine-zinc insulin. The length of time the insulin lasted was a function of the amount of zinc added.

It wasn't until the 1950's that the Lente series of long acting insulin became available.

The next big leap in insulin technology came in 1978, from a small biotech company with just 12 employees. Genentech sent a scientist named Dennis Kleid to visit a facility in Indiana that made insulin from hog and cattle pancreases. Kleid noticed there was a long line of train cars filled with frozen pancreases. At that time, it took 8,000 pounds of pancreas from 24,000 animals to make one pound of insulin! Eli Lilly needed 56 million animals annually to meet the rising U.S. demand for insulin.

Another issue was that some people with diabetes had an allergic reaction to the animal insulin. Eli Lilly saw a need for a synthetic insulin. It had started a race in 1977 to do just that by writing contracts with a number of institutions to bioengineer synthetic insulin. Harvard and the University of California - San Francisco were experimenting with rat versions of the insulin gene.

Genentech had the ability to produce synthetic insulin in its laboratory in very small amounts from Escherichia coli (E. coli). Kleid saw three problems to be addressed:

1. Could the bacteria produce enough to replace all the animal insulin and meet the needs of the U.S.?

2. Could the bacteria produce insulin in a high enough concentration?

3. Would it be economically feasible?

He envisioned, "the bacteria would have to produce so much of the protein per cell, they would look like stuffed olives under a microscope." Kleid told Bob

Swanson, founder of Genentech, he thought it couldn't be done. To which Swanson replied, "I don't want to hear the word impossible. Tell me what you need to get it done."

Genentech had a good reputation in biotechnology from synthesizing somatostatin in small amounts. Somatostatin is a peptide hormone that regulates the endocrine system and controls the growth of normal and tumor cells.

Swanson was able to raise the funding and joined the race. He hired a team. The first two were Kleid and his colleague, David Goeddel, from Stanford Research Institute, where they were conducting research on cloning DNA. He added scientists Roberto Crea, Arthur Riggs and Keiichi Itakura.

Swanson began to set up a lab in an air freight warehouse in South San Francisco. The team was ready to go but the lab was not, so they started at the City of Hope National Medical Center in Los Angeles. They kept the experiment running 24 hours a day.

The investors wanted success. Goeddel expressed it as, "You either came in first or you might as well be last." If they failed to be first, there would be no more Genentech.

The team had many challenges and many setbacks. For example, somstostatin had only 14 amino acids, an insulin molecule has 51. They needed to put into one molecule two chains of insulin encoding DNA and two different bacteria working side-by-side. In the wee hours of the morning of Aug. 21, 1978, Goeddel succeeded in reconstituting the two amino acid chains into one molecule: Human Insulin!

They produced a sufficient amount of the insulin for Eli Lilly to conduct clinical trials. Eli Lilly found not only was the synthetic insulin as effective as its chemically-identical human twin, but it eliminated the allergies some diabetic patients had to animal insulin.

Kleid's concerns about producing enough insulin still loomed over the party. They needed the bacteria to produce 50 times the present yield.

Genentech scientists Herbert Heyneker, Dan Yansura and Giuseppe Miozzari discovered a powerful control gene that when inserted at the right moment instructed the plasmids to reproduce in large quantities, filling the bacteria with insulin peptides (stuffed olives).

It took an additional two years to accomplish their mission. In 1982, human insulin received FDA approval and was on the market in 1983 under Eli Lilly's name "Humulin".

Humulin acts like the insulin produced by the pancreas, which responds quickly to elevated glucose.

Intermediate and long-acting insulin were developed in the 1930s. In 1996, the first rapid-acting insulin, Lispro (also sold under the brand name Humalog), was developed by Eli Lilly and approved by the FDA.

There are several types of ultra rapid-acting insulins on the market. Humulin and Lispro are just two of them.



Leaders and managers of teams are uniquely positioned to influence and inspire their team's engagement and actions. They create high engagement levels over time by continuously focusing on the fluctuating needs of their team. Gallup research, through a contract with the United States Postal Service, identified 12 elements that exist in every high-performing work environment.

Behind each of these elements is a fundamental truth about human nature. These 12 elements of engagement are the most powerful factors that explain the product motivations of team members. The focus of the research was on employees, but I think it applies to teams of all kinds. The 12 elements are broken into an engagement hierarchy: Basic Needs, Individual, Teamwork and Growth.

BASIC NEEDS

1. I know what is expected of me. (Focus me)

Perhaps the most basic of employee needs in the workplace is knowing what success on the job looks like. Employees need to know what is expected from them at work so that they can commit, deliver and focus on what matters most. Groups with high scores on this item are more productive, cost-effective, creative and adaptive.

Expectations serve as an employee's point of focus, helping them know what to do and where to go. And, importantly, expectations provide direction on how each person can meet the desired outcomes of their role.

On average, about half of workers are not completely clear about what they are supposed to do at work. Role clarity is much more than just a job description or a list of things to do. It is about an employee understanding his or her contribution, value and fit within the team.

The three types of expectations are functional, emotional and relational. Functional expectations include the role's tasks, responsibilities and metrics. The emotional expectations involve the working environment and the organization. The relational expectations involve the team's collective expectations and expectations of one another.

High performance in every role starts with the manager consistently communicating expectations, the purpose of the role, a clear understanding of priorities and objective targets for improvement and growth. This communication helps employees understand what is expected of them and why.

The most effective managers provide employees focus and direction by incorporating the following behaviors into their management style and approach:

- Define excellence in each role. Be clear on what excellence looks like and sounds like.
- Communicate each employee's role and responsibilities, and ensure that the entire team knows each person's responsibilities.
- Set aside time to explain to each employee how they each contribute to the team's success.
- Conduct regular team meetings to ask about the clarity of expectations. Help employees make sense of the changes around them and better understand how they can expect team members to respond and interpret events and issues at hand.

2. I have the materials and equipment I need to do my work right. (*Free me from unnecessary stress*)

Nothing is more frustrating than feeling as if you want to do a good job at work but don't have the right equipment to do so. When employees lack the means to do their work well, frustration with their inability quickly follows, as does anger with the manager or the organization for placing them in such a difficult spot.

More than 30% of workers in the U.S. say that stress on the job has caused them to behave poorly with family or friends in the past month. Managers with bottom-quartile performance on this measure average 20% to 40% higher employee attrition than their top-quartile peers. This represents millions of dollars in direct and indirect turnover costs.

One of the most insightful findings from Gallup's research on this element of engagement is the variability of perceptions among workgroups. Even in the most legislated working environments where materials and equipment are essentially the same across business units, ratings on this element fluctuate significantly.

The variation in ratings lies in front-line managers' involvement, judgment and action. About four in 10 workers globally strongly agree that they have the materials and equipment to do their job right.

Despite the functional nature of the statement, this engagement item measures both physical resource needs and the potential barriers that exist between manager and employee.

The three material and emotional needs are, a) Hardware: the tangible tools and equipment necessary to do the work, b) Software: the systems and processes in place (including access to information) that maximize productivity, and c) Humanware: appropriate staffing and the acceptable handling of equipment requests. The most effective managers know that they can affect engagement by how they focus on and respond to the resource needs of their employees. Great managers involve their employees in the process of identifying resource requirements and solutions to the challenges they face.

The most effective managers respond to their employees' workplace needs by incorporating the following behaviors into their management style and approach:

- Continuously look for materials and equipment that will assist employees in performing their jobs efficiently and effectively.
- Follow up regularly with employees to make sure they have the tools and information they need to perform their jobs effectively.
- Teach employees how to access the information they need to do their jobs right.
- Promptly respond to requests for tools and equipment that employees need to do their jobs properly, even if you cannot grant the request.
- Hold open conversations that encourage team members to talk about what they need to perform their jobs.
- Come up with operational alternatives together as a team to navigate barriers that might be getting in the way of the team's performance.

I will bring more information from Gallup's research in the coming issues of *The Iowa Lion*. Stay tuned!

Please remember to report all service no matter how small or unimportant you think it is. Report your individual service to your club secretary every month. Club secretaries will report general club service, but they need each Lion member to provide them their service hours monthly.

Please do everything you can at the local club level to retain members and increase membership. If you do not know what to do, ask your club officers, your zone chair or any district cabinet member.





While this year has been a year like no other, many clubs and districts have been successful in forming new clubs and recruiting new members. Set up a booth at a local community event to promote your club. This gives you an opportunity to talk to members of the community and tell them about what your club does.

Host a service project and invite the community to participate. This helps the public get to know about your club and you a chance to ask them to join.

Last year, Lions Clubs International President Jung-Yul Choi virtually led the swearing in of new Lions around the world. Check with your district governor or district Global Membership Team coordinator to see if your district has plans to celebrate Lions Worldwide Induction Day.



TIPS TO REDUCE, REUSE, RECYCLE!

Transportation

- Take public transportation, car pool, use bicycles, or walk.
- When driving, accelerate gradually; use cruise control. Keep tires properly inflated.

Computers and Electronics

- Turn off computers, TVs, radios, etc. when not in use.
- Plug all electrical cords into a power strip and turn the strip off when not in use.
- Recycle computer disks, cell phones and other "technotrash."
- Use rechargeable batteries.

Lights

- Use ONLY Compact Fluorescent Light (CFL) bulbs. (They use 75% less energy and last 10 times longer!)
- Always turn off lights.
- Utilize natural light whenever possible.

Paper and Other Disposables

- Use old newspapers as wrapping paper.
- Use canvas or other reusable bags when shopping.
- Buy items in bulk to reduce packaging waste.
- Bring a coffee mug to work instead of using paper or plastic.
- Instead of disposables, use silverware and plates that can be washed.
- Compost food scraps and yard waste, keeping them out of landfills.
- Use cloths instead of paper towels, paper napkins, etc.

Appliances & Home Energy

- When purchasing new appliances, look for energy efficient models.
- Set home and office refrigerator temperatures between 36 and 42 degrees Fahrenheit (2.2-5.5 degree celsius).
- Clean furnace filters and refrigerator coils once a month to increase efficiency.
- Use a programmable thermostat for heating/air conditioning.
- Use the microwave, toaster oven or other small appliances instead of the oven or range.

Water

- Take short showers.
- Fix leaky faucets. Invest in low flush toilets, showerheads and faucets.
- Turn the water off when brushing teeth or shaving.
- Wash only full loads of laundry using warm or cold water.
- Use white vinegar instead of fabric softener in laundry.
- Use a half white vinegar & half water mixture to clean glass.
- Water lawns and gardens at the coolest time of the day.
